

## Topic of Interest Questions

#### **HOW IT WORKS**

Answer each question on some aspect of your work experience, then pull your answers together into a paragraph of up to 1000 characters for your personal statement.

## Medicine

Think of any interesting cases (diseases/conditions/treatments) you came across during your work experience placement(s) in whatever setting that was.

- These do not have to be dramatic situations.
- Very common conditions can provide excellent material.
- Look through the questions below to get a sense of how you will be analysing your chosen case study.
- Use this to help you select one case study to analyse.
- Prioritise examples where you were able to find out some key details about the patient and you witnessed interaction with a carer/medical professional.

### **Questions**

- What did you notice originally about the patient/condition and how it was dealt with?
- Why did this grab your attention?/ What did you already know in general about this condition/issue?
- What did you learn about the background to this specific case? Did you ask any questions or pick any details up about the patient or this condition?
- What can you find out about the scientific background to this disease/condition/treatment?
